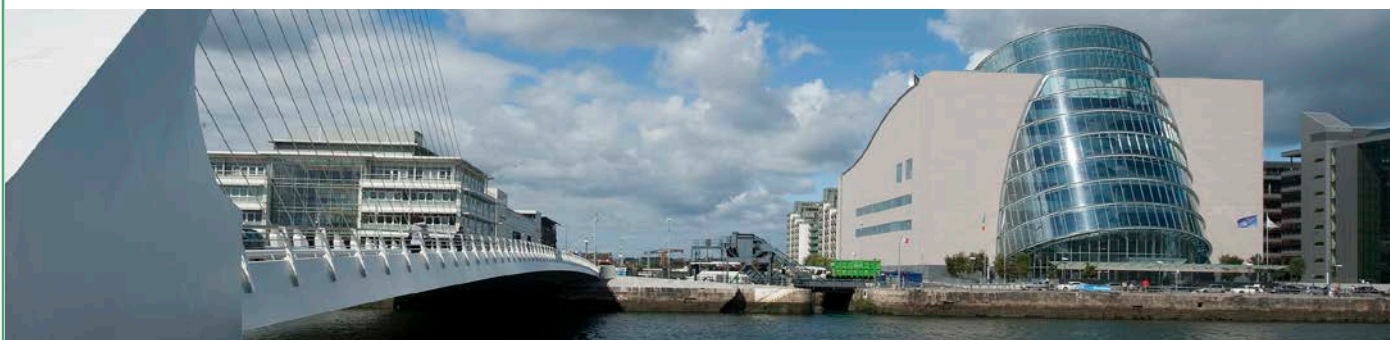

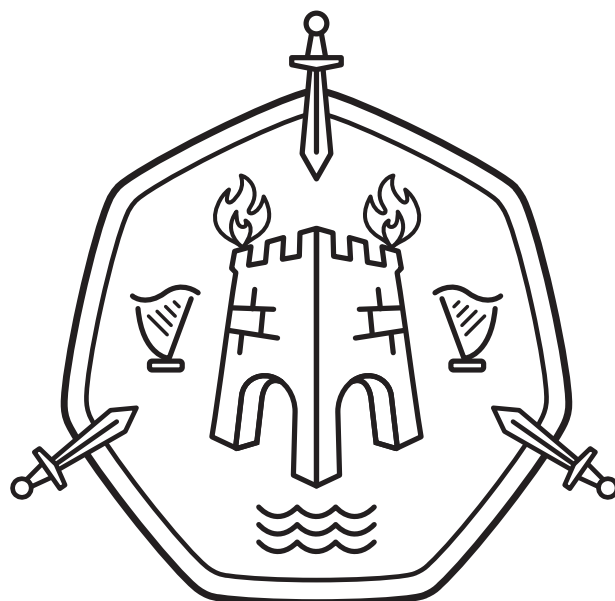

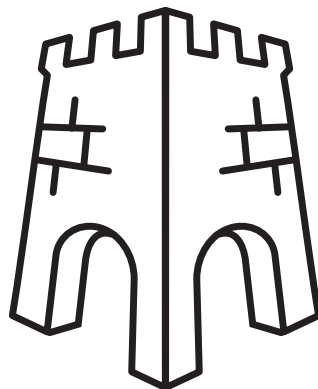

## Dublin Travel Information

### Dublin Airport

Dublin airport is located approximately 6 miles north of Dublin City centre. The airport has flights to 42 countries on four continents and over 180 different destinations. There are various methods of transport to the city centre from the airport which are easy, affordable and comfortable.

### Express Public Bus (Airlink)

The airlink is an express bus service from the airport to the city centre of Dublin. The Airlink stops at all the main bus tops which are Busaras, O'Connell Street and Heuston, costing €6 for one way and €10 for a return ticket. Airlink buses depart every 15-20 minutes from the airport from 5am to 11.30pm and the duration of the journey is around 40 minutes.

### Express Private Coach (Aircoach)

The Aircoach is a privately-operated 24-hour service that provides transport from the airport to the city centre. The Aircoach takes only 25 minutes and costs €7 for a single and €12 for a return ticket.

### Public Bus (Dublin Bus)

The regular public bus service also runs from the airport to the city centre and is the cheapest option costing €3.30 for a single – this must be paid in exact change. The journey time is around 40 minutes, traffic dependant.

### Taxi

Taxis are also available as transport from the airport to the city centre, most taxis take a maximum of four passengers and the taxi will cost €25 to €30. Not all taxis accept card payment, so it is best to have some Euros ready (there is an ATM in the arrivals hall at the airport).
